THE SEASON OF ADVENT

"Is Your Heart Open to Christ?"

Advent is a four-week time which includes prayer and our preparation as we look forward to the coming of the Lord Jesus Christ among us. This time fills us with joy and love in the Lord, and calls us to share those feelings with others. As our hearts open in prayer during Advent, may the "Good News" of Jesus be heard throughout the world so hearts are turned to love and peace.

Advent offers the opportunity for renewal. God invites us to let Jesus come into our hearts so that we can be more like Him. We live it in expecting the fullness of joy to come. We set out to love God each day and live out our baptismal call by loving and serving others. This is the way Jesus wants us to make straight for Him in our hearts as we await His coming.

Third Week of Advent

Begin by making the Sign of the Cross.

All: Who made heaven and earth.

Reading: Zephaniah 3: 14-18a

Shout for joy, O daughter of Zion! Sing joyfully, O Israel! Be glad and exult with all your heart, O daughter Jerusalem! The Lord has removed the judgment against you. He has turned away your enemies; the King of Israel, the Lord is in your midst, you have no misfortune to fear. On that day, it shall be said to Jerusalem: Fear not, O Zion, be not discouraged! The Lord, your God, is in your midst, a mighty Savior; He will rejoice over you with gladness, and renew you in His love; He will sing joyfully because of you, as one sings at festivals.

Candle Lighting

Light the two previous lit candles and the pink candle.

As we light these candles, let us give thanks to the child whom we celebrate this Advent season—the child who came to earth as an infant, died, and rose as our Savior, and for whose coming again we wait with anticipation and love.

All loving and powerful God, we shout for joy for the gladness You have placed within our hearts. As we continue to celebrate Advent, remove the anxieties that the season can bring. Remind us that we await a mighty Savior, an infant child that will bring gladness to all. We will walk with You today, Lord, with confidence in the promise of Your love. We will show Your kindness to all your people, especially those who have yet to know the goodness of Your Son. We pray this in the name of Christ Child. Amen.
